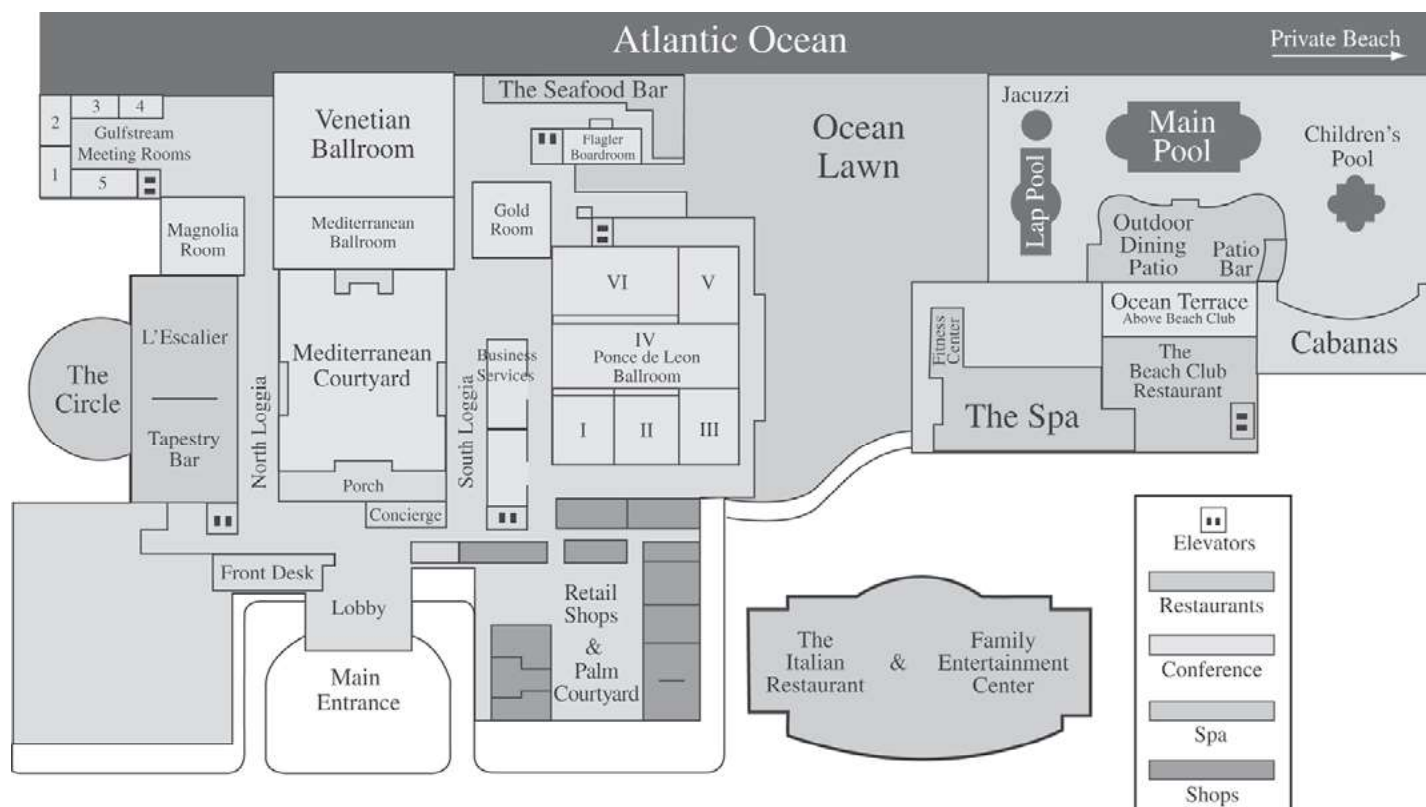

DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD RECIPIENT



Dr. Sonya Pease has been a diplomat of the American Board of Anesthesiology since 1999 and an active member of the ASA and FSA since 1994. She is a past president of the Florida Society of Anesthesiologists having served from 2008-2009 and currently serves as an ASA delegate for Florida. Dr. Pease received her master's to become a Certified Anesthesiologist Assistant (CAA) in anesthesiology from Emory University and her medical degree from the Medical College of Georgia before completing her residency in anesthesiology at the Jackson Memorial Medical Center in Miami, Florida. Dr. Pease completed her MBA at the Haslam College of Business at the University of Tennessee in Knoxville, Tennessee.

Dr. Pease has been a lifelong advocate for both patient safety and for the specialty of anesthesiology. As a patient advocate Dr. Pease has always championed innovative patient care delivery models through her work with the ASA Committee on Future Models of Anesthesia Practice and helped pioneer the Perioperative Surgical Home model of care throughout the country in her role as Chief Clinical Officer of TeamHealth Anesthesia with dozens of publications establishing this proof of concept. Additionally, in this role, she has also aided in developing and implementing Optimetrix™, a national anesthesia quality registry that serves as a clinical and operational tool for monitoring practice performance and benchmarking quality measures to identify and share clinical best practices. Dr. Pease also serves on the ASA Committee on Performance Outcome Measures and has worked closely with regulatory authorities and commercial payers to help establish quality measures for the specialty of anesthesiology.

Dr. Pease's professional advocacy for the specialty of anesthesiology includes legislative efforts to allow CAA's to work in the state of Florida as well as over 10 years of service on the ASA Committee on Economics which is responsible for overseeing the financial aspects of the specialty including statements and guidelines and annual revisions to the ASA's Relative Value Guide. Dr. Pease is currently working as the Chief Clinical Officer of TeamHealth Anesthesiology and works clinically at St. Mary's Medical Center and Children's Hospital in West Palm Beach, Florida.

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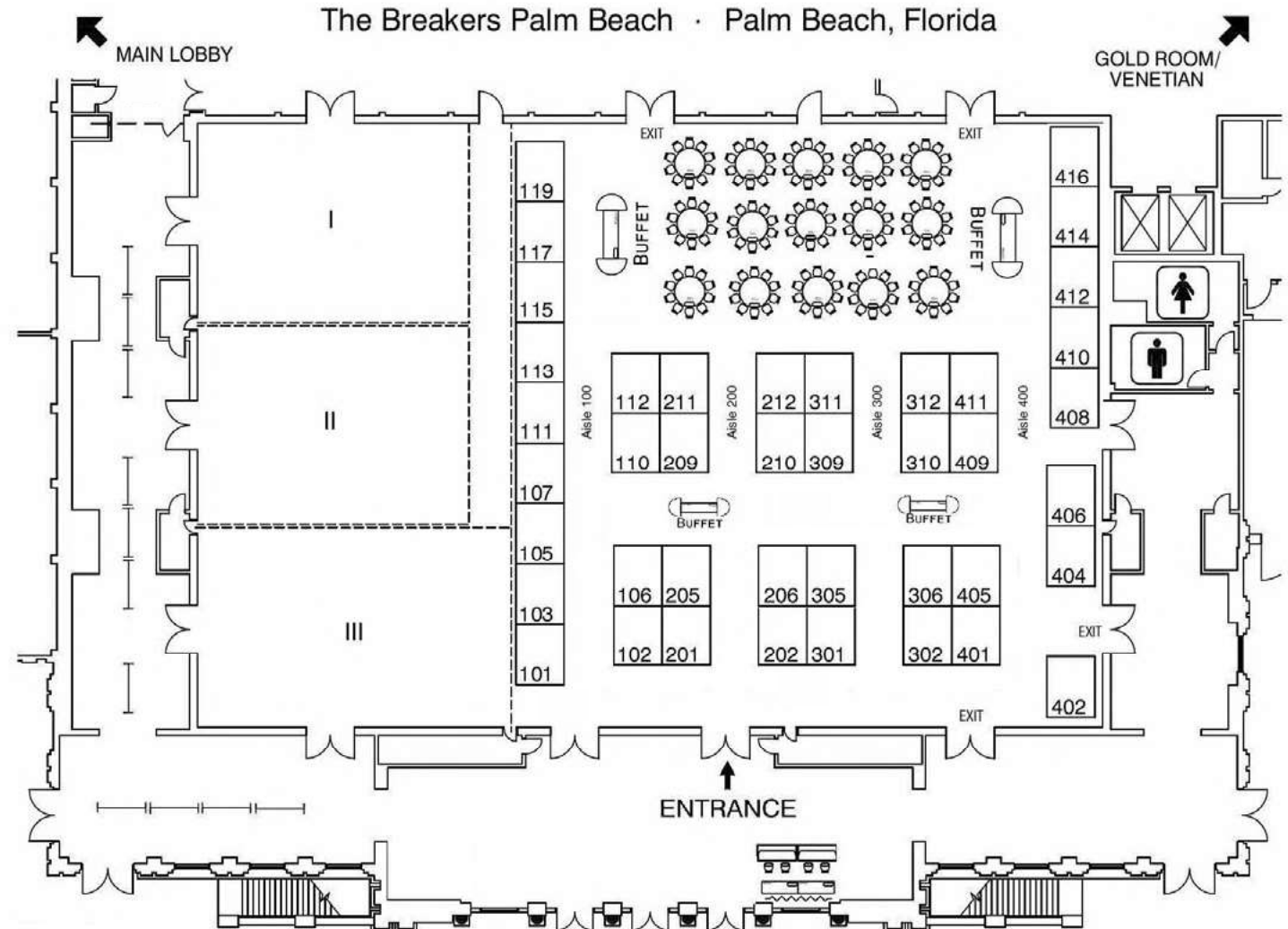

IN MEMORIAM



We were very saddened in February to hear the news of the passing of our long-time friend, colleague and FSA member Dr. Rafael Miguel. Dr. Miguel was an accomplished and highly sought-after leader in the field of pain management, working for over 30 years on the faculty of the University of South Florida, eventually holding the positions of Chairman of the Anesthesiology Department and Director of the Pain Fellowship. He was the inaugural Chair of Anesthesia at Moffitt Cancer Center in Tampa, where he distinguished himself as a top-notch clinician and researcher.

Dr. Miguel helped to educate a generation of anesthesiologists and pain specialists in the Tampa area. He served Florida Governor Jeb Bush as the Vice Chair of the Florida Board of Medicine and was also a consultant to the DEA. He was very active in organized medicine, serving as a Delegate to the Florida Medical Association and the American Society of Anesthesiologists, and chair of the FSA Pain Medicine Committee. He was a past president of the Florida Society of Interventional Pain Physicians and was honored with an FSIPP Lifetime Achievement Award. He served as the FSA President 2006-2007 and received the FSA Distinguished Service Award in 2013.

Born in Cuba, Rafael was one of 14,000 children who emigrated to the US during Operation Peter Pan following the Cuban Revolution. He was raised in Miami and attended Medical School at the University of Cadiz in Cadiz, Spain. He completed his residency in Anesthesiology at Tulane University. He is survived by his partner Dianne Dombrowski and his daughters Sara and Ava.
